General Concepts

What is a Budget?

A budget is an estimation of revenue and expenses over a specified future period of time and is usually compiled and re-evaluated on a periodic basis.

A budget can be prepared at any level- for an individual, group of persons, an organization, a government or any other activity which involves generation of revenue/spending of money.

Components of Budget

Every budget should broadly contain a detailed account of the revenue and expenditure. According to the constitution of India there is a three-tire system of government. These governments prepare their own respective budget namely Union Budget, State Budget and Municipal Budget.



PARTICIPATORY BUDGETING

- Union Budget: Its also referred as annual financial statement to keep track of estimated receipts and expenditure of the government for that particular fiscal year.
- State Budget: On march 7th our finance minister introduced Telangana budget for 2022-23 in the State legislature with an outlay of 2,56,958 crore including Rs 17,700 crore for its new flagship Dalit Bandhu.
- Municipal Budget: GHMC council approves annual budget of Rs 6,150 crore for FY 2022-23. Mayor G.Vijaylaxmi said the budget gave priority to city's development and infrastructure.

Participatory Budgeting (PB) is a democratic process in which community members decide how to spend part of a public budget. It gives people real power over real money. The participatory budgeting was originated in Porto Alegre, Brazil in 1989 as an antipoverty measure.

Steps for Participatory Budgeting:






A steering committee that represents the community creates the rules and engagement plan.



BRAINSTORM

Through meetings and online tools, residents share and discuss ideas for projects.




DEVELOP **PROPOSALS**

Volunteer "budget delegates" develop the ideas into feasible proposals.



The government or institution funds and implements the winning ideas.
